Menchú Tum was awarded the 1992 Nobel Peace Prize for her social justice work on behalf of women, the indigenous and vulnerable in her native Guatemala.

A Perfect Match (Day)

The third Friday in March is a big day for every medical school in the country. On this day every year, the National Resident Matching Program makes it known to aspiring doctors which hospital, program or facility has offered them a space in their residency programs. UIW's **Match Day Celebration for the School of Osteopathic Medicine** (UIWSOM) was abuzz with cheers from family, friends and faculty as students opened their envelopes and learned of their placement. UIWSOM hosted its first Match Day in 2021 with 96 percent of students matching, followed by 2022 and 2023 with 99 percent of students matching both years.









A transformational \$2.5 million grant from the Hector and Gloria López Foundation is creating new, life-changing opportunities through the **López Scholars program**, which will support the full cost of attendance for 15 Latino students for the entirety of their undergraduate studies up to five years.

UIW and Methodist Healthcare Form Partnership

Research Week

The Office of Research and Graduate Studies spotlighted the exceptional research produced by UIW scholars at the **17th Annual Excellence Summit 2024** (Research Week 17.0). Faculty and students from all disciplines gathered to share their latest discoveries via poster presentations, a service-learning showcase, keynote addresses and a roundtable.



Building UIW: Founders Hall

In May, UIW received a pledge of \$5 million to support the development and renovation of Founders Hall. Envisioned as a gateway to global understanding, the San Antonio community and academic excellence, Founders Hall is the planned home for the Liza and Jack Lewis Institute of the Americas, an auditorium, a health clinic, programs within the School of Mathematics, Science and Engineering and the School of Media and Design, among others. The eight-story, 350,000-square-foot, 10-acre property was designed by noted architect Atlee B. Ayers in the 1950s and is currently undergoing extensive renovation in preparation for the first phase of development. The purchase of Founders Hall in 2018 expanded the Broadway campus by 20 percent.

Spring Commencement

With thousands of friends, family and supporters cheering on, UIW proudly conferred professional, doctoral, graduate and undergraduate degrees to more than a thousand students at the 2024 Spring Commencement ceremonies. Two ceremonies were held, celebrating undergraduate and graduate students in the morning, and health profession program students in the afternoon. Faculty lined the coliseum aisle applauding their students as they processed. At the conclusion of both ceremonies, President Evans left the graduates with a final piece of advice invoking UIW's core values: "The world is uncertain — no one knows this better than you — and the road ahead will present you with new and unpredictable challenges. When you meet them, do not doubt yourself or your abilities. Instead, look to your FAITH, apply your exceptional EDUCATION, tap into your INNOVATION, seek the root of TRUTH, approach life with hearts for SERVICE, and then, take action."



Faculty innovations, student discoveries and novel endeavors marked an extraordinary academic year.

Ambassadors for AI Innovation

ChatGPT launched a year ago, but in its young life, the artificial intelligence platform, and others like it, have impacted nearly every facet of education and industry. At institutions like UIW, this poses unique challenges for faculty tasked with broadening students understanding of the world, forming them in Mission and the Catholic Intellectual Tradition, and preparing them for ethical leadership in rapidly changing professions.



"I liken AI to the industrial revolution," said Lucretia Fraga, PhD, associate professor of Teacher Education. "We learned that we don't have to be redundant to machines, but instead work with machines. Now, we have to work within new parameters, again. So, we have created an interdisciplinary group to determine how UIW moves forward to prepare students for careers that are impacted by AI."

The Teaching and Learning with Artificial Intelligence Fellowship, co-coordinated by Fraga, seeks to address these challenges as well as the emerging opportunities that AI presents for faculty. This spring, 10 faculty fellows were selected from a pool of dozens to serve as peer mentors and ambassadors for best practices.

Fellows will take part in professional development sessions and explore questions of ethics, bias and all of the ramifications AI has on teaching and learning. In turn, fellows will lead professional development sessions within their individual schools and help empower faculty to view AI through the lens of experiential and problem-solving learning.

Social Entrepreneurship & Global Good

Every year, student teams test their entrepreneurial mettle at the Startup Challenge. The semester-long competition sponsored by the H-E-B School of Business and Administration and Beckendorf Center for Innovation and Global Entrepreneurship seeks the best social

entrepreneurship solutions to real-world challenges.

Teams took part in workshops and mentoring, and moved through rounds of business model presentations in hopes of making the top three and coming away with seed money to fund their new enterprises. This year's theme was Impact, Innovation, & Sustainability.

Beckendorf Center Directors Jose Moreno, PhD, and Teresa Harrison, PhD, noted that the top three winners "were chosen based on criteria like feasibility, creativity, scalability, and market potential."

First place and \$8,000 in funding went to 2Hydro Hero, a sustainable automated irrigation system designed by a team of students from UIW Campus Bajío in Irapuato, Mexico. RGV Freeze Dried Treats, which creates pet treats from invasive species in



Texas, earned the second place prize and \$2,000 in funding. Finally, GYV, a business focused on holistic, clean energy solutions to promote more sustainable lifestyles, won 3rd place and \$1,000.

UIW Talks TEDx

In September 2023, after more than a year in the making, UIW hosted its first TEDx event. It marked UIW's first collaboration with TED, the global non-profit dedicated to sharing ideas that ultimately drive change. TEDx UIW 2023 focused on a central theme: the 21st-Century Revival of the Liberal Arts.

"The idea developed from three prongs," said Dr. Javier Clavere, dean of the College of Humanities, Arts and Social Sciences. "The first was the promotion of scholarship on a global level with high impact in a way that is sustainable and distributable. The second was to support the branding of the university as an academic think tank. The third was to think beyond the academic journal and offer a new platform for sharing the scholarly work being created at UIW."

Nine faculty members delivered talks on topics ranging from refugee experiences as told in stories, to erasing mental illness stigmas, to the art of giving feedback, among many others. Clavere's own presentation on humanistic entrepreneurship proposed an approach to business enterprise that upholds and perpetuates human dignity. Together, their presentations offered a spectrum of work as broad as the liberal arts themselves.

All talks are available to stream via the TEDx Talks YouTube page. Clavere is looking forward to the next TEDx event in September 2024 that he plans to make available to all faculty members interested in applying. He hopes to be able to open the third event to student presenters.







Incubator for International Leadership Formation

Fifteen students and alumni were nominated for a first-ofits-kind mission trip just before the start of the fall semester. The UIW Centro Fox Leadership and Mission Program, sponsored by the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership and Sustainability, was formed to help foster greater understanding of contemporary Mexico and community leadership through engagement with the agencies and actors at the forefront of advancing social change.

The interdisciplinary group of students from different backgrounds and academic programs met with leaders at partner organizations such as Centro Fox, founded by Vicente Fox, former president of Mexico, and Vamos México, founded by Fox's wife and former first lady Marta Sahagún Fox. Additionally, the group discovered on-the-ground approaches to addressing real community needs. One such experience focused on providing therapy for disabled children of low-income families.

"As a doctoral student, I was excited to explore what I previously learned in my studies focusing on my concentration in adult education, social innovation and entrepreneurship," said Michelle Vasquez, '03, '20. "Throughout the week, I traveled to various communities to visit museums, local businesses, and nonprofit organizations ... to learn about Mexico's rich history, culture, people, economy, government and community relations."

A Transformative Grant with Community Impact

Before it had even welcomed its first cohort of incoming students, UIW's new Occupational Therapy doctorate program (OTD) was already making history. Last spring, OTD announced their award of a landmark \$5.2 million Mental Health Service Providers Grant from the U.S. Department of Education.

Together with grant partners Our Lady of the Lake University's School of Psychology, and two San Antonio school districts, UIW's OTD program had three goals: increase the presence of mental health professionals in public schools, develop comprehensive and streamlined

trauma-informed training, and establish pathways for high school students to pursue careers in mental health.

Incoming OTD students supported the grant work and helped ensure that outcomes surpassed every benchmark. "Our goal was to place eight occupational therapy students in schools. We placed II. They served 190 students, more than our initial goal of 100," said Marcie Campbell, OTD, OTR, TIE, the grant's principal investigator and project director. "We also placed a social worker in the schools as a pathway specialist who mentors high school students to pursue mental health careers."



The trauma-informed training developed through the grant and in partnership with the nationally recognized Community Resilience Initiative, generated broad interest nationally. In the coming months, up to 2,500 occupational therapists in New York City will take part in the training, and later so will others in Philadelphia, Oregon and Alabama.

VOICES & VIEWPOINTS

UIW welcomed many notable speakers to share their insights on faith, scholarship and expression.

- For the first time, an artist was invited to offer the annual Bernadette E. O'Connor Lecture on the Catholic Intellectual Tradition. Painter, glass artist and restorer, **William Rerick** shared his reflection on the impact of Catholicism on his work.
- Internationally recognized theologian **Dr. Thomas Groome** also visited the university to discuss "What Makes Education Catholic" at UIW.
- **Dr. Jessica Coblentz** was the featured speaker of the Pierre Lecture, which focuses on the contributions of women scholars to the fields of theology and religious studies. Coblentz explored theological resources for living with depression.
- During Women's History Month, contemporary author **Katy Carl** was invited to offer her perspective on keeping the Catholic literary tradition alive.
- Dr. Kim Harris led UIW in reflection and song.
- Incarnate Word Week festivities included two presentations from Dr. Kim Harris, assistant professor in the Department of Theological Studies at Loyola Marymount University. First, she offered a lecture on "The Ritual Gifts and Cultural Advocacy of Servant of God Sr. Thea Bowman." Later, she led the UIW community in reflection and song in "Digo Sí, Señor: A Song of Sustainability as We Dance with the Sun and the Moon," which focused on the relationship between care for the Earth and care for our brothers and sisters.



WORD IN THE WORLD

Students, faculty and staff also serve communities around the world. Throughout the year, several interdisciplinary teams from UIW's health professions and liberal arts programs set off throughout the Americas to support community health and health education.

- A team of students and faculty from the departments of Nutrition, Education, and Religious Studies partnered with the Lewis Center of the Americas for a **Guatemala solidarity trip**.
- Another team led by the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership and Sustainability in connection with non-profit Los Quijotes of San Antonio engaged faculty and students from UIW's Nursing, Osteopathic Medicine, Community Health, Pharmacy, Optometry, Physical Therapy and Nutrition programs for a **medical mission trip** to help provide much-needed care for families in Oaxaca, Mexico.





SERVING THE COMMUNITY

Community service is an integral part of the student and academic experience.

- Thousands of **hours of service** are completed annually and make distinct differences in the community. Students, and often faculty and staff, take part in efforts such as childcare, environmental clean-up, blood drives, care for animals, senior citizen engagement, clothing drives, community gardening, food drives and many others.
- Service-learning opportunities through UIW's clinics the Bowden Eye Care and Health Center, School of Rehabilitation Sciences Community Clinic, Nursing Cardinal Clinic and others provide care for communities in need and support the professional development of health professions students.

- Throughout the academic year, DEI Circles welcomed hundreds to listen and discuss issues related to racial justice, peace, life and human dignity, the gifts of diversity, LGBTQ+ allyship, and implications in healthcare.
- **Cultural celebrations and holiday events** such as Asian New Year, Cardinal Ceilidh, Holi, Hangul and Día de los Muertos invite all to come together to learn about our international community.

MINISTRY CONNECTION

Deepening our connection with our founders, the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word, and our sister ministries is a strategic priority. New initiatives and special celebrations honoring our connection have taken place throughout the year, and two significant projects have undergone further development.

- UIW's historic home on the Broadway campus borders other ministries, including the Headwaters of the Incarnate Word nature sanctuary and the Village at Incarnate Word retirement community, as well as the Sisters' own property, chapel and Blue Hole. The Spirit Reach Contemplative Path project would connect those ministries in a more meaningful way by providing walking and biking paths that are accessible to all. The project secured \$10 million in funding and is currently in the design phase.
- The **CCVI Migration Project**, spearheaded by the Lewis Center of the Americas in partnership with the Sisters and the Migration, Immigrant and Refugee Network, seeks to create a digital directory of resources for immigrants who are making their way through Mexico, typically with hopes of reaching the United States. Many of these migrants are coming into Mexico from Central and South America, while others are Mexicans themselves but traveling from their home state into new Mexican territories. The goal is to help those seeking refuge and alleviate suffering along their journeys.

Champions in Competition

It was a year for the record books for UIW Athletics as stellar student-athletes proved that they are champions in their sports. The Artistic Swimming team was named **2024 USA Artistic Swimming Collegiate Champions**, earning UIW's first ever team national championship. Head Coach Alyson Tshuma was named National Coach of the Year. Men's Track & Field had a tremendous season, bringing home the Southland Conference (SLC) Indoor and Outdoor Track & Field Championships. Men's Tennis won the SLC Regular Season Championship, Coach Jonas Andersson was named Coach of the Year and six team members earned all-conference recognitions.

Cardinals also came away with individual honors. Kyle Sieracki was named Athlete of the Year, Most Valuable Performer and Outstanding Field Athlete at the Indoor Track & Field Championships. Rico Braun received a Men's Fencing All-American Honorable Mention. Brandon Porter was named Southland Football Offensive Player of the Year, Stats Perform All-American and Associated Press All-American.

Champions in the Classroom

As successful as Cardinals were on the field, on the court, on the track and in the pool, they were equally as exceptional in the class-room. This year, student-athletes started strong, earning the highest department GPA for the fall semester on record. Three hundred and sixty six student-athletes recorded GPAs of 3.0 or higher with more than 50 earning a 4.0 or higher. UIW student-athletes also led the Southland Conference Commissioner's Honor Roll with the most appearances from any member university in Fall 2023.







Champions in the Community

Another critical component of student-athlete life is a commitment to putting the Mission into action through community service. Cardinals' good work supported organizations throughout San Antonio such as the San Antonio Zoo, Boys and Girls Club of San Antonio, Haven for Hope and others. Cardinals also took part in river cleanup efforts, assisting with Special Olympics events, and leading Big Brother Big Sister donations, and volunteering with the ministries of our founders, the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word.
